I, Salvador Antonetti Zequeira, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Puerto Rico, CERTIFY THAT:

The Board of Trustees, at its regular meeting on Wednesday, July 22, 2009, with the prior recommendation of the President of the University of Puerto Rico, approved the following:

# INDICATORS TO ASSESS THE OPERATION OF THE INTEGRAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF PUERTO RICO, TEN FOR THE DECADE

Whereas: TEN FOR THE DECADE, An Agenda for Planning, was approved by the Board of Trustees in May 2006, through Certification No. 123 (2005-2006), after a broad consultation process with the University community, such as the comprehensive development plan for the University of Puerto Rico.

Whereas: The aforementioned Certification No. 123 provides that "[t]he Chancellors and the institutional units shall guide their respective development plans in harmony with TEN FOR THE DECADE, following its structure and phases, with the purpose of reaching its goals in the context of the nature and particularities of the unit." It further provides that "[t]he Chancellors and the institutional units shall ensure that the development plans for their respective units conform to the parameters, mechanisms, and general protocols for assessment and evaluation that might be defined in relation to TEN FOR THE DECADE, so as to achieve a logical calibration for the implementation of said agenda."

Whereas: An analysis to discover gaps conducted by the units comparing their strategic plans with TEN FOR THE DECADE shows that, while sole strategic plans were developed before TEN FOR THE DECADE, there is a high correlation between the goals and objectives of the unit strategic plans and the System's Agenda for Planning. The analysis shows that, on average, each of the 102 objectives is covered by 90% of the units.



Whereas: The University has identified eighteen flagship projects, seven systemic

projects, and eleven distinctive projects of the units that together, directly and indirectly, advance all ten goals set out in TEN FOR THE

**DECADE.** 

Whereas: A budgeting process has been created to allow units to establish

priorities under their own strategic plans and TEN FOR THE DECADE, and to report specific activities and the resources that will be allocated to meet those objectives. See, Certification No. 100 (2005-

2006).

Whereas: In order to put into operation the comprehensive development plan for

the University of Puerto Rico, TEN FOR THE DECADE, seven operational strategies have been defined to cover all operational aspects of the development of the plan within the framework of the University's

organizational structures.

Whereas: During the 2008-2009 academic year, the reports of the Chancellors

and the President to the University Board and the Board of Trustees and the institutional report to the Office of the Comptroller of Puerto Rico were redrafted to align them with the operational strategies and flagship projects that resulted from the operation of the plan, TEN

FOR THE DECADE.

Whereas: During the 2008-2009 academic year, the Board of Communicators of

Ten for the Decade was formed with representation from all units to announce the activities carried out by the University under to the Agenda for Planning, using as the main source of communication the

blog Ten for the Decade Advances.

Whereas: During the 2008-2009 academic year, through a participatory design

and conceptualization process involving various sectors of the eleven units of the University of Puerto Rico, the University developed thirty (30) indicators to measure progress of within plan TEN FOR THE

DECADE.

Whereas: The thirty indicators developed by the University represent specific and

measurable aspirations for the University according to the Agenda for Planning, TEN FOR THE DECADE, and are culmination of a concerted, structural process of operationalization, and are the result of a highly participatory process involving various sectors of the

University community and academic leaders.



Wherefore: The Board of Trustees certifies the thirty indicators that are incorporated herein as the quantitative and qualitative basis of assessment which, together with the periodic reports of the President and the Chancellors at the University to the Board of Trustees on each of the operational strategies and flagship projects, and with the contextualization that may be necessary for the objective assessment of the data collected, will contribute to the continuous improvement of the University.
